### Contributors to This Issue

Matt Tomlinson is an Australian Research Council Future Fellow in Anthropology at the College of Asia and the Pacific, Australian National University. He has conducted fieldwork on Christianity, language and politics in Fiji since the mid-1990s, and has recently undertaken research in New Zealand and Samoa on the development of indigenous Christian theologies. He is the author of *In God's Image: The Metaculture of Fijian Christianity* (2009) and *Ritual Textuality: Pattern and Motion in Performance* (2014), and co-editor of several volumes including, most recently, *Christian Politics in Oceania* with Debra McDougall (2013).

Minako Kuramitsu is currently an Associate Professor in Asian and Oceanian Studies, Faculty of International Studies at Tenri University, Nara, Japan. She has conducted fieldwork on gender, development and clothing culture in the Independent State of Sāmoa since 1999 and more recently undertaken research in New Zealand and Japan on Sāmoan female migrants.
